

The Hierarchal Society is based on power and control.

The individual must find their place in the hierarchy and conform to the structure and the laws that govern it. Only those at the top are considered noble.

It operates by laws created by man.

The Indigenous Society is centered on individual responsibility, respect & self-worth.

It is based on peace, harmony, love & contribution.

It is represented by a circle, where each individual is considered noble, and power resides within the individual. It follows Natural Law.



This Society is based on a patriarchal system, placing men at the center of power.

It requires man to dominion over nature and his own nature.

It is his responsibility to uphold the hierarchal system, and seek his place as close to the top of the hierarchy as possible.

It is a competitive society of winners and losers.

Man is required to sacrifice his life if the hierarchy demands it.

The man is the Head of the Nuclear Family.

The Indigenous Society is an extended family.

It is primarily a matriarchal society, which encourages cooperation rather than competition.

It emphasizes living in harmony with nature and our own nature.

The children are the center of the community.

As the mother is dedicated to serve the children, the father is dedicated to serve the family.

He would naturally give his life to protect his family.

Typically the women choose their leaders from observing the behavior of their children.



The hierarchal world is one of Good and Evil. It is a binary world that gives power to the evil within us.

Indeed, we are born with Original Sin and must seek salvation to be at one with the Creator.

Man created laws that define evil, and hierarchal organizations around these definitions.

There is an assumption that we are not fully responsible for our actions because evil is so powerful.

Because of fear, we sometimes give the responsibilities of charting our lives to others we regard more responsible.

There is great stress to conform to the norms of society.

In the Indigenous world, people are beautiful spiritual beings of light housed in flesh, connected to the Creator and all living beings, as well as the Universe and beyond.

There is no evil, one does not need to fear themselves, nor the Creator, which is the embodiment of love and caring.

There is a belief in following ones own heart and ones own higher self, for we are god-like beings, and are basically loving and caring creatures.

There is only good, and a crooked good that needs to be straightened out. We would not even acknowledge evil by giving it a name.

We are fully responsible to straighten out our own negative thinking, or we'll give ourselves a headache and make ourselves ill as well as those around us. We may affect our whole environment. We are fully responsible to keep our minds in a good way.

A Hierarchal World View believes that a child is a Tabula Rasa, a clean slate.

Knowledge is like a pitcher of water. You must pour it into the individual until you are completely filled with outside knowledge.

When you are deemed knowledgeable by this society, and conform rigidly to the guidelines of its institutions, then you are given a diploma, a degree etc. that places you on the level of the hierarchy which is predetermined by society.

To gain credibility you seek the knowledge of others, and any contribution you make must be legitimized, by those deemed more knowledgeable than you.

In the Indigenous Society you are born complete, and you seek knowledge from within yourself and the Creator that guides you.

Knowledge has little value unless it is relevant to your own inherent knowingness.

We are the grandchild of all of our ancestors that came before us.

We are the grandparents of all future generations.

Within us is all knowledge of the past, present and future.



The Hierarchal Society has created powerful technologies that force competition and stresses that each person excel within these created structures.

As man is naturally territorial, it develops weapons of mass destruction that continue to accelerate.

The spin-off of these technologies, primarily designed for warfare and competition, can be beneficial if used in a positive way. For example: computers, the Internet, nuclear power, and alternative sources of energy in competition with traditional forms such as coal and gas.

Seeking knowledge and invention can be a powerful tool for a society's livelihood.

Indigenous World View emphasizes creativity and ingenuity, balancing the needs of people with the resources they need to survive.

Fire...



We are an intrinsic part of all life on this planet, no matter how insignificant it may appear to us.



we disconnect ourselves from the source and disconnect ourselves from each other and from all life itself.




When we communicate with the Creator we pray in the six directions:

This symbolizes all of the forces of creation with which we connect ourselves.








We are an intrinsic part of creation and we are at one with the Creator. Thus, on this planet we are co-creators and have been given the powerful gift of creativity.
